Speed limits in the state could increase to 80 miles per hour on certain roads under legislation... The package (HB 4423, HB 4424, HB 4425, HB 4426, HB 4427) would raise the speed limit on rural limited access freeways to 80 miles per hour and require the Department of State Police and road authorities use the 85th percentile method to set speed limits. Rep. Bradford Jacobsen (R-Oxford), who is the lead sponsor of the bills, said he has been working on the package for about three years.

“Lower Drinking Age May Lead to Increased High School Dropout Rate: Study”

Lowering the minimum drinking age from 21 to 18 could increase the high school dropout rate, a new study suggests. The presence of legal-aged peers in a high school setting increases access to alcohol for younger students, researchers report in the [Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs](#). The researchers examined dropout rates in the years before the minimum drinking age was raised to 21 by the National Minimum Drinking Age Act of 1984. New CAMY Research

A new paper from researchers with the Center on Alcohol Marketing and Youth (CAMY) and the Boston University School of Public Health finds overall exposure to brand-specific alcohol advertising is a significant predictor of underage youth alcohol brand consumption, with youth ages 13 to 20 more than five times more likely to consume brands that advertise on national television and 36 percent more likely to consume brands that advertise in national magazines compared to brands that don’t advertise in these media.
